

PROGRAM COMPONENTS:

- Language Instruction and Strategies, which may include the following per parent priority:
 - O Multilingual/Bimodal language instruction with both American Sign Language (ASL) (using the ASL at Home curriculum with supplemental ASL curricula as needed), and Listening and spoken language strategies for various spoken home languages
 - American Sign Language instruction, both individualized and/ or group instruction using the ASL at Home curriculum (with supplemental curricula as needed).
 - For both in-home and group classes, Listening and Spoken Language (LSL) strategies (25+ strategies) are used to interact with your child to help them learn to listen and talk. This may include Auditory Verbal Therapy (AVT)
 - Credentialed teachers serving children with a deaf education eligibility, and their families
- Service coordination and case management
- Intake and assessment to determine the child's educational needs, and interdisciplinary collaboration to develop an Individualized Family Service Plan (IFSP)
- Specialized instruction and parent training regarding hearing levels, as well as all 5 areas of development (Self-Regulation, Social & Emotional, Language & Literacy, Cognition, Physical & Health)
- Signed, spoken and/or written support for the range of home languages
 Services provided in the natural environment of the home and community.
- Group family education centers to provide opportunities for parents to interact with other parents of children with differing hearing levels, facilitate deaf education, including ASL/LSL, and emphasize quality of life within the family; transportation available
- After school ASL Classes for families
- Auditory Verbal Therapy (AVT)
- Transition and Individualized Education Program (IEP) development for preschool as children turn 3 years of age
- Bilingual support, including ASL and spoken languages

Los Angeles Unified School District (LAUSD) offers a comprehensive array of educational services to assist families with infants and toddlers (birth to 36 months of age) with the Low Incidence (LI) eligibility of Deaf and Hard of Hearing (DHH). The early intervention team of professionals work with parents, families and students to provide a variety of services to meet the developmental and language needs of its students.

The family, as the child's most important resource, receives support to strengthen and secure child-to-parent attach ment and bonding, which optimizes learning potential and development across all domains.

Our services are part of the California Early Start Low Incidence Program and is provided at no cost to families under the provisions of federal law (IDEA, Part C), in the family home, other natural environments, or daycare setting.
